There are six distinct weather periods recognised in the Gariwerd Seasonal Cycle

Kooyang Edition 2018 Season of Eels-January-March

The Season of Kooyang is depicted by eels, galaxia, baby animals, mistletoe as well as eeling and fishing. Kooyang is the peak time for eel with eel trapping common during this season, a favorite food of the Gariwerd people.

Stone huts could be seen on salt Creek for the harvest. Herbal medicines are available: Old man weed for cold and chest

complaints,

Tannins from gums and wattles for stomach complaints and burns.

The stars were used for navigation with star formations having creation stories. Tree frogs can be heard squeaking.

Many insects can be seen in larval form or beginning to hatch and Gum emperor moths emerge. Stick insects eat treetop leaves and imperial white butterflies can be seen.

Some plants continue to flower including mistletoes, messmates and long leafed box. The flowers of River Red Gums attract honeyeaters. Snakes can be seen basking in the sun and mammals appear during Kooyang. Water boatmen migrate

from drying ponds and many aquatic insects emerge as adults, attracting Swallows and Martins. Galaxias (small native trout) move downstream to estuaries to spawn.

Environmental Flows

Summer/Autumn low flows and freshes are continuing for the Burnt Creek, Wimmera River, Mt William Creek and MacKenzie River. Low flows range from 5 ML/d for the Burnt Creek through to 30 ML/d for the Wimmera River. Occasional freshes are also taking place for several days at a time ranging from 30 ML/d to 100 ML/d depending on the waterway. These flows are important to manage water quality issues (Wimmera River) and provide habitat (other waterways). There was an unplanned hiatus in flows for several days due to the fatality at MacKenzie Falls in January. When pipeline demands reduce, deliveries will also commence to Fielding's Dam

After many years of it being out of action due to vandalism, bushfire and flood impacts GWMWater are starting to use the fishway at Dad and Dave Weir on the MacKenzie River at Wartook. This will be useful for Platypuses traversing this stretch of river as well as facilitating movement of Obscure Galaxias (the key reason it was constructed). They have been noted to aggregate in large numbers downstream of barriers in summer.



Planning for 2018-19 is continuing with the focus on developing the Seasonal Watering Proposals.

Fragile Native Fish

Environmental flows from Lake Lonsdale are targetting a fragile native fish population in Mount William Creek. Latest research surveys of the creek, a priority waterway for environmental flows, discovered a River Blackfish and self-sustaining populations of small native fish including Flat-headed Gudgeons and Obscure Galaxias. Low flows of 10 megalitres a day from Lake Lonsdale over the next few weeks will help keep refuge pools topped up and preserve habitat and water quality for the native fish.

Wimmera CMA CEO David Brennan said he expected the environmental water from Lonsdale to continue along the parts of the creek that flow through Ledcourt through to Dadswells Bridge but not much further, depending on weather conditions.

"The purpose of these releases is to focus on Mount William Creek only, to ensure species such as River

Blackfish can persist and be ready to breed and disperse in the cooler months when rain arrives," he said. "Environmental water for the Wimmera River will be delivered from Taylor's Lake."

Mr Brennan said preliminary results of the Victorian Environmental Flows

Monitoring and Assessment Program (VEFMAP) show that flows are having a

positive impact on fish numbers in the creek.

"Many people fondly remember catching large numbers of fish in Mount William Creek in the past but due to habitat loss, introduced species and droughts their numbers have drastically declined," he said.

The VEFMAP program is also returning positive results for nearby Burnt Creek and MacKenzie River.

"Over the years, drought conditions, water extraction and sedimentation of deep pools meant these waterways increasingly lost vibrant and diverse fish populations. Wet conditions during the past two years, combined with regular environmental flows, have boosted fish numbers and allowed them to repopulate. We are excited about these monitoring results, which indicate waterway health in these areas has turned a corner."


- * Environmental water releases in Mount William Creek are prioritised as part of the <u>Victorian Environmental Water</u> <u>Holder's (VEWH) Seasonal Watering Plan 2017-18</u>, which aims to improve river and wetland health across the state.
- * Wimmera CMA has released its planned flows for summer, which it adjusts depending on weather conditions, HERE.
- * VEFMAP is funded through the Victorian Government's \$222 million investment in waterway and catchment health over the next four years.




NATIONAL HARMONY DAY
